### TESSA'S STORY—by her new owner!

Tessa is a 15 month old black and white female cat who had a bad start in life. At about 8 months old she found herself **pregnant and homeless - oh, and she's also blind.**

She came into our lives about 10 months old, by which time she had had her three kittens and they were old enough for her to leave them, so, she left Animal Care and came to live with us. Because she is only a small cat, and having just weaned her kittens, she was **painfully thin.** Due to her blindness she had to be allowed to learn the lay out of the house as soon as possible - which she did very quickly as she is a very confident little girl. She walked around the whole house, a little cautiously at first, learning where things were when she bumped into them.

Although rather underweight, she has always had a good appetite and has now doubled her weight since she arrived and is now a very healthy weight.



She settled down to our way of living very easily and is almost totally accepted by the other cats. She is an **adorable** little cat and very affectionate. She wants to be stroked on a regular basis and likes to sit on knees. She is always first at the door waiting when I come home and I can't imagine life without her now.



### CHARLIE'S STORY

This was Charlie in October 2004 as a pup of 10 weeks old. He came to us via the local dog wardens

as he had been found wandering the streets. Not only had this poor pup been abandoned but he also had a suspected **broken front leg.**

He was a lively pup who liked nothing more than to torment any other dogs into playing with him even with his poorly leg. After tests it was found that Charlie's leg had broken and set in an odd position as part of his leg was growing faster than the other. After lots of soul searching Charlie had his leg operated on rather than having it completely remove. After weeks of confinement and **more operations** Charlie was finally able to gallop around on his 'new' leg.

He was a very lucky boy not only because his leg has now become fully usable but he found a fantastic home whilst all the work was being



done and now spends his days playing with his sister Peg (Charlie on left, Peg on right) It has cost so far over **£3,000** for Charlie's treatment and we will pay for any future work he made need on his leg so this shows how every regular donation goes towards us helping the animals in our community that have been abused and discarded.

**How** can people do such a terrible thing to such a lovely little dog you my ask. Charlie is only **one of many cases** where we pay medical costs for life for an animal. It may be an old dog on tablets, a cat in need of a dental or a rabbit with eye problems. Our vet bill is approximately **£50-60,000 a year** so please help us help the abandoned and unwanted animals.
